Ulladulla SCAN Weekend

On the weekend of 12 to 14 November 2004, the Scuba Clubs' Association of NSW (SCAN) held its annual dive weekend. For the first time the weekend was held at Ulladulla, just over 200 kilometres south of Sydney.

SCAN is composed of independent scuba diving clubs and membership is open to all such clubs in NSW and the ACT. Most of the independent clubs in NSW and ACT are members.



The weekend normally starts with divers arriving at the location on Friday evening but this weekend saw large numbers of St George Scuba Club and Ryde Underwater Club members together with a couple of South Pacific Divers' Club and Port Hacking Divers arriving on Wednesday and Thursday for some early diving. Thursday morning saw me taking my boat Le Scat with a full load of St George members and Kelly Jandik driving the Ryde club boat (with Rvde and St George members) out to Burrill Rocks. This is a fantastic dive location, with many different dives sites around the rocks. We had good conditions, with 15 metre visibility and lots of fishlife. A raging north-easterly that blew up while out at sea meant that a second dive was out of the question.



The next day saw four boats from St George as well as the Ryde boat out diving Burrill Rocks again. This time we dived Burrill Rocks Caves, an excellent dive site. A second dive was done by most at Burrill Rocks East Wall. Visibility this day was even better, 20 metres with very good fishlife again.

Friday night saw all the rest of the divers arrive. Members from Wollongong University Dive Club, Australian National University Dive Club, the Dive Organisation of the University of Technology Sydney (DOUTS), the Underwater Research Group as well as additional members of the four clubs already in attendance.



Saturday morning dawned with a big crowd of divers at the two Ulladulla Harbour boat ramps setting out for various dive sites. Burrill Rocks was again popular for the first dive but a very strong south-westerly change meant that this was not an option for later dives. During the day, divers dived Home Bommie, various parts of

Lighthouse Wall as well as North Bommie. The ANU divers went south to dive around Brush Island, including the wreck of the SS *Northern Firth*.

Saturday night was again the big SCAN barbecue. This started early with members supplying a great range of nibblies to go with pre-dinner drinks. Members of all the attending clubs mixed while sharing dive stories. As normal, SCAN supplied the food for the barbecue which was soon underway, with Dave Burns the Chef in charge. All members and their families enjoyed the barbecue, with everything consumed before the night was out.

For the first time in many years, the night did not end with members of St George Scuba Club being the last ones standing. This time, the younger members of the Wollongong and ANU unis were still up when all the members of the other clubs were well asleep in bed.



Sunday morning was perfect weather, flat seas and sunny skies. A little later start for most clubs saw all but one boat head south to Burrill Rocks to dive The Hole. Local diver, Ken Kates, had used his boat to take some of the DOUTS members diving over the weekend and this day he showed us this great site. While none of us actually found the feature after which the site was named, we all agreed that this deeper (33 metres or so) site was as good as any location in NSW.

By mid-afternoon, everyone had packed up and headed for home. This was a very successful weekend, with an attendance of over 80 from eight clubs. The nine boats used on the weekend did numerous trips out to the dive sites and everyone was happy with the range of dive sites

visited. Once again, St George Scuba Club took the prize for most members attending, with a total of 25 members and family.

The 2005 SCAN Dive Weekend will be held on the weekend of 11 to 13 March 2005 to better enable the university dive clubs to attend in greater numbers. This weekend will be held at Nelson Bay.

Many thanks to SCAN President, John Olsen and SCAN Treasurer, Les Caterson, who organised the weekend, the many members who assisted with the barbecue and catering. Thanks also to the members who brought their own boats or crewed the club boats. Thanks also to Ulladulla Headland Caravan Park where most divers stayed as well as Ulludulla Divers Supplies who provided air fills at a very good price.

Undersea Explorer Trip 2005

With much excitement – (this holiday had been a long time coming!!), we set off on our journey north to dive from the Undersea Explorer at Osprey reef.

We flew to Cairns where we met up with some of the other members of DOUTS (University of Technology Dive Club), then on the shuttle bus for the hour road trip to Port Douglas. We then went straight to the office/shop which is based at the Marina and had our first glimpse of the ship that was to be our home for the next 7 days. We got all our gear on board then went into town to make a few last minute purchases, have our evening meal, then back on board to meet the staff. We had our final briefing including safety procedures, then headed off for the overnight trip to the outer barrier reef.

1st day was spent at the Ribbon Reefs doing some easy dives, getting used to the boat layout and diving procedure. Flat seas, blue warm water with usual array of tropical fish and coral gardens. Viz was varied between 10-20 metres on all the dives that day. We then had another overnight trip, this time out to Osprey reef, which lies approx 250 nautical miles off the coast, north of Cooktown. This is what we were waiting for! Very blue, almost navy water, flat seas, blue sky and 27 degree water temperature! The viz was 30 mt + and an amazing variety of fish life, including big schools of pelagics and

white tips and grey whaler sharks were encountered on every dive.

For the next few days, we quickly adopted the habits of live-aboard diving!

The routine involved an early morning light breakfast then first dive of the day at about 7am, then back on board for hot breakfast followed by 2nd morning dive then lunch which was usually followed by a siesta on the upper-deck. The afternoon dive was followed by afternoon tea then a night dive, evening meal, video (if able) before crashing out from the strain of diving and eating!! The diving at Osprey is excellent. Most of the sites are moored with amazing drop offs and walls going down to about 5000 mtrs right up to 5 metres, so wonderful, multi –level diving with full range of marine life to see at all the different depths. We were also able to participate in the research they perform on a regular basis as nautilus observation and shark tagging/identification. Nearly all the dives were drift dives with an easy drop off and pick up system which included a height adjustable back platform which was lowered as you approached then it was just a case of swimming straight onto it where the crew helped you with fins etc.

Because the seas were so flat, we were also able to dive at a site known as shark reef which is just south of Osprey and rarely visited as it has no cay or shallow reef protection. The reef itself is pristine but subject to some quite strong currents which made the dives interesting!! The viz here was the most I have ever experienced with of 60 +Schooling estimates metres. hammerheads were seen off in the blue with lots of whalers and white tips cruising by. We were also lucky to encounter 2 large scalloped hammerheads, which came and investigate what all the noise was. (The divemasters would take down an ordinary plastic drink bottle and "crack" it underwater which did actually attract the sharks!). We were only able to spend the day at shark reef before heading back to Osprey for the night dive and then reluctantly left Osprey for the overnight trip back to the Ribbon and Agincourt Reefs. We then spent the next morning diving here (2 dives) before heading back to Port Douglas. All up, you are able to do 22-24 dives (usually 3 day, 1 night dive) on this trip.

We were blessed by great weather and wonderful conditions the whole time we were out at Osprey and experienced some of the best diving I have done both in Australia and overseas. The accommodation on board is basic but very comfortable with a mixture of queen-sized cabins and twin bunk bedded rooms. Other facilities are all shared. There is a large dining/meeting area inside and an open but covered eating/sleeping/lounging area upstairs, which was well utilised during the day. There is also a "dry" room where all the microscopes (for all that research) and electronic equipment such as videos, television and computers are kept. is where they have the This biology talks/education videos, which you can go to if desired or just hang out and wait for the evening movie. The staff are nearly all marine biologists with dive master and instructor going out on every dive (usually the cook and assistant would also jump in with the first group but made sure they were back in time to tend to our needs!!). If the dive reports were good, the rest of the staff would jump in once we were all back – this was often the best time to go diving as with less divers in the water, more "things" would come in to investigate what was happening!!

DOUTS have an annual trip on the Undersea Explorer, usually at the same time (November). The trip includes 6 days/nights on-board with all diving and meals, transfers from Cairns to Port Douglas and one night's accommodation in Port Douglas on the return journey. They are also able to organise this trip at a discount price (\$1650 this year) and try if able to secure the whole boat (20 divers). The trip is open initially to DOUTS members, then opened further to other SCAN club members.

This is a fantastic, affordable live-aboard experience and so enjoyable that we have put our names down for the trip for next year. I will keep everyone informed via the newsletter of the trip for 2005 for those who may be interested in joining us.

Chuuk Lagoon Trip - Sept 2004 by Michael McFadyen

On the evening of 2 September 2004, Eddy Labour, Louise Crowell, Ida diCamillo, Dick Fish, Daryl Gibbs, Heinz Bendinger, Phil Rose, Peter Trayhurn, Bruce Graham, Kelly Jandik and I as well as Ryde Underwater Club member Martin Clarke, assembled at Cairns International Airport to await the flight early the next morning (12:10 am). Most of us had arrived earlier that day and had dinner and a few drinks in Cairns before returning to the airport.

The plane was on time and we had a four and a bit hour flight to Guam where we had to wait another four hours for the connecting flight to Chuuk. The Guam airport is now a very modern affair, hundreds of times better than when I last transited through it in 1991. We did not get much sleep, either on the flight or at the airport, but most managed a couple of hours.

We arrived in Chuuk to a warm day and were met by the owner of the Truk Stop Hotel, Bill, and his dive organiser, Warren. We settled into our rooms bought some supplies (breakfast, beers etc). After lunch, headed out for the first dive of the trip.

The Truk Lagoon Dive Centre has a couple of boats, one a large 40 plus foot twin diesel and a smaller twin outboard powered boat. We were on the larger boat but there was only one problem. One motor was missing, away getting repaired.

This severely limited the speed of the boat. As well, there were problems starting the engines which meant that once started, the engine was left running the whole day (a little noisy when having surface intervals).

Anyway, off we went to the *Heian Maru*. This ship was a submarine tender and has fantastic things like periscopes and torpedoes in hulls and passageways. What an introduction to Chuuk for everyone. The water was 29 degrees or so every dive and visibility varied from 30 metres to five to seven for a couple of the wrecks. The *Heian* was about 15 metres or so.

Dinner choices were the Truk Stop restaurant (mostly good, fair priced), Blue Lagoon Resort, formerly Truk Intercontinental Hotel (much better than last time, about same price as TS but poor service) and a little restaurant across the road from the Truk Stop (not bad and quite cheap). The beer prices were outrageous so we ended up most nights having nibblies and beers on the wharf watching the sun go down.

The next day we headed off to the Gosei Maru. This was an excellent dive, with 25 metre viz. Next dive was the Fujikawa Maru. This was a lot dirtier (strange as it is not all that far from the other wreck) and the front holds were filthy. We suspect that some previous divers must have really stirred it up as the viz was only a couple of metres. Still, an excellent dive. At the end of our bottom time, we went to ascend the mooring line but we could not find it. Daryl ascended and I could see him scanning the waters, looking for the boat. I ascended and at first could not see the boat either. Then we saw it miles away. It started back towards us so I descended to do some more safety stop time. It turned out that the boat had broken the mooring line and it had taken the skipper a while to pull all the deco lines etc in.

Sunday 5 September saw us diving the *Nippo Maru*. This is one of the best wrecks in Chuuk, with a mini tank on the deck, trucks on the sand and deck, field guns on the rear deck and large gun barrels and gun bases on the rear deck and holds. The day was very hot and absolutely no wind with mirror seas.

From here we went to the *Kiyosumi Maru*. This is another great wreck, with things as diverse as a room with five or so lanterns, bicycles, spare props and more. After the dive, it was very hot and as we waited for Martin to finish his deco

(he misread his computer and stayed way more than he needed), I started to feel very faint and funny. I was very hot and even though I had been drinking lots of water, I was burning up. For the past couple of days I had a very hard bloated stomach and had not been to the toilet. Finally Martin was back on board and we headed back to shore. I was now a bit dizzy and we had run out of water on the boat.
