


ST. GEORGE SCUBA CLUB 40TH ANNIVERSARY

16th February 2013

We had two boats for this dive - Le Scat and Argonaut, Phil Short's boat. On Le Scat we had Michael, Kelly, Gary, Nancy, Jason and from Melbourne John MacPherson, who was visiting for a week leading up to the Anniversary Dinner. On Argonaut Phil and his son were joined by Greg, Shelley and Tong.

Conditions were good, there was some wind and a bit of sloppy swell, but fortunately we avoided the showers. It wasn't clear what the current was doing as

the boat didn't turn with the wind after we picked in, but it wasn't strong once we got in the water.

Michael, Kelly and John went first and then Gary, Nancy and I jumped in after we saw their bubbles back under the boat. The water was a very respectable 20c but it was fairly cloudy and the vis was only 6 – 8 metres.

As we dropped down, the resident trumpeters (Tassie or Bastard I'm not sure there is agreement on which ones they are) were hanging in a crack in the reef. They are a good size and relatively unusual to see. It is very special as

They are only found in Eastern Australia but not seen often as they live generally at a depth of 20 metres or more. I have only seen them 2 or 3 times. And of course once you find one or two... we then saw several more during the dive.

Towards the end of the dive I found some tiny sea fleas (which was great because I was missing

my 'Sea Fea' – Rox was in NZ for the weekend) crawling around a grey sponge. Even at full zoom with two macro lenses you could still hardly see them.

We came to the surface to find the wind had dropped off but the swell was probably increasing. We headed back into Port Hacking for morning tea at Dark Water Bay. Donuts seemed to be the food of choice but some chose a more healthy diet of salad and fruit. Another great dive at one of the best sites in Sydney. Thank you to Tash for organising in absentia and for Michael and Phil for making their boats available.

SEAHARES OF THE BASIN, ROYAL NATIONAL PARK

The Basin is a sandy tidal creek that flows through a mangrove forest on the southern shore of Port Hacking, between the suburbs of Bonnie Vale and Maianbar. It is only a few hundred meters from the popular Shiprock diving site, but has a markedly different character, habitats and occupants. In the January newsletter I offered some images of one of the Basin's more distinctive occupants, the Southern Dumpling Squid. This month's species are another group that is particularly common at the Basin, Seahares.



There are at least three different species in the Basin, all quite different in appearance and habits. Seahares are named for the resemblance of at least one European species to a hare sitting on its haunches. I'm not convinced that the body form of the local species is particularly 'hare like', however their heads are topped by a pair of ear like flaps that are very much reminiscent of a hare or rabbit. Those heads are constantly moving from side to side in search of their next mouthful of the algae, making for the most expressive and least sluggish of all the sea slugs.

Seahares are exclusively herbivorous with a preference for algae and seagrasses. They have an internal shell that is cloaked by the rear 'wings' or parapodia. Some species swim by undulating their wings. All seahares are hermaphrodites. However, unlike many other molluscs the position of their male and female organs means that two seahares cannot fertilise each other at the same time. One of the consequences is that they are often seen in chains of several mating individuals, with those in the middle acting as both male and female, but the two at the ends only performing as one sex or the other.

Seahares have a number of defensive strategies to discourage predators. They exude toxic skin secretions, with a Western

Australian species frequently implicated in the death of dogs when they get washed ashore and eaten. They also share the trick of inking with the cephalopods, although in the case of Seahares the ink is a deep purple rather than black.

The most common Seahare in the Basin is Aplysia sydneyensis. This species is small, up to around 20cms, and is very active by day. Most are shades of grey and brown, although a few are brighter yellow and greens. Their flanks have a fine tracery of lines that helps to break up their profile. They are most often seen in the seagrass beds although they also clamber over kelp and mangrove roots. They often seem much confused when they reach the tip of the mangrove roots and stretch upwards before turning back.






The other common species is the large Wedge Seahare, Dolabella auricularia. The common name refers to its distinctly triangular appearance. Unlike the smooth skin of the other Seahares the Wedge Seahare has a mottled and highly irregular surface, looking something like a hairy triangular brick. This species is quite cryptic during the day, hiding in crevices in the reef. At night it emerges to browse for microalgae over the sandflats and across reef. It grows to more than 30cms and is distributed through the tropical Indo Pacific region.

The third and least common Seahare, Aplysia extraordinaria, is also the largest at up to 40cms in length. This species is distributed along the east coast of Australia. It has very large parapodia and can be observed actively swimming in search of a fresh patch of algae.

BARRENS HUT

9 February 2013

With a number of the boat owners away or heading away the club dive planned to Wattamolla was limited to one boat - Argonaut.

We met at Yowie Bay boat ramp, loaded the boat and headed out. On the boat were Phil Short and his son Dave, Gary Perkins, Ian Roffey and myself. With a forecast of strong NE winds to come in mid morning it was decided that Barrens Hut would be as far south as we should venture.

We anchored on the second attempt up on the reef just south of the swim through. Conditions were fine with no wind and a small surface chop. First group in was Gary, Ian and myself.




Visibility was not bad at around 10m plus. After setting the anchor we swam over to the wall and along to the swim-through. There was a lot of loose kelp but we were able to push it aside and swim through. Ian and I went through, Gary on the rebreather decided not to.

Regrouping, we headed further north and explored the cave and overhangs, sponges and sea whips that are profuse along the wall. Not a lot of fish life – just the usual red morwongs and red scorpionfish - though Gary did find an unidentified nudibranch on one of the small reefs.

We returned back to the anchor, explored a couple of the small overhangs, finding a friendly cuttlefish, before heading up to do our safety stop. Phil and Dave came down the anchor line as we were coming up and they had a good dive also.

Morning tea was had anchored at Bass and Flinders in the sunshine before we headed back to the boat ramp.

CLIFTON GARDENS 16 February 2013

The post appeared on Facebook on the Thursday – Natasha and Digby were planning an afternoon dive followed by a BBQ followed by a night dive at Clifton Gardens on the Saturday afternoon. Donna and I made a late call and decided to go.

We had an easy drive over from the Shire with not a lot of traffic. Clifton Gardens car park was quite empty – must have been due to the overcast and sometimes showery weather and coolish breeze – so parking was not an issue. It could also be due to the exorbitant parking fees - \$25 to park to go diving....

> There were a total of 8 divers and after kitting up we hit the water. Digby is still on extended shore leave so he babysat our picnic spot. Visibility was very average – at best around 2m. This made one really focus on all the little stuff!

Donna and I explored under the jetty, finding lots of seahorses, a black anglerfish, a large green moray, plus various bits of fishing gear

before we headed out to the mooring buoy. We went across the sand, found the chains, followed to the buoy, finding a nice denisons dendrodoris nudibranch, then followed the second chain line out towards the wrecks. The visibility did not get better, the water got colder, so we turned around just short of the wrecks. On the way back Donna found a nice tiger pipefish on the sand. Back under the jetty we revisited the seahorses and found a cute brown sabretooth blenny sticking his head out of a bottle.

Reports from the other divers were similar with a brown striated anglerfish and a white anglerfish found – making a total of 3.


Due to the poor visibility it was decided to break out the beer and wine and nibbles early and enjoy the BBQ and forgo the second dive, making for a very pleasant evening.

We will be diving with Dive Timor Lorosae (DTL). Check out their website at: www.DiveTimor.com

We will be staying in the guesthouse, which is located alongside the dive shop right on the beachfront in Dili. Above the accommodation is the Castaway bar and restaurant. The complex has its own pool. It is located in Dili itself so it's a short walk to other restaurants, shops, markets, etc.

The four boat dives will be to Atauro Island - see the DTL website for details.

We have also arranged with DTL that we can have an optional third dive per day, which will be at Pertamina Pier. This is one of the best muck dives in East Timor. If we choose to do a third dive, the dive operator will supply a driver to take us to the Pertamina Pier (a 5 minute drive) and wait for us to do our dive before transporting us back to our accommodation. These additional dives are \$25 per diver.

The trip is limited to 8 divers and as at 13/11/2012 we have 4 spots available.
