#### Solitary Islands Trip 23<sup>rd</sup> – 28<sup>th</sup> September 2007 By Jason Coombs

Back to Dive at Mullaway on what is fast becoming an annual pilgrimage, 12 of us headed up the coast Rox and I, Phil Rose, Mark Ridsdale, Dave Burns, Dave Casburn, Nick Windle, Ray Moulang, Heinz, Mike Scotland and Graham Poole.

On the Saturday Rox and I had driven to Byron Bay and got a couple of dives in on the Sunday. We arrived in Mullaway late on Sunday. Dinner was at the local RSL as members progressively arrived after the long drive from Sydney.

On the first day our boat comprising Rox and I, Dave B, Phil and Ray headed for North Solitary and Anemone Bay. Rox and I had had a classic dive here 2 years earlier so we were looking forward to it.

The visibility was about 15 metres and we saw several large grey nurse sharks, a turtle and a couple of kingfish. We also found an excellent flatworm (nudibranch without horns) and other macro life among the anemones.

Our second dive of the day was at Fish Soup (at North Rock). It is well known for the big jewfish that congregate there. And while we didn't see those there was excellent fish life including black cod, sweetlips, goat fish, tarwhine, pomfrets and kingfish.

Dave Burns was angling for a special mention by the newsletter editor by first knocking the gear bin over and my mask to the bottom of the ocean. As he was still coming up from his dive Phil Rose retrieved it for me.

Dave followed this up by illustrating for the other boat how big the grey nurse shark he had seen was. As he stretched out his arms he gave me a backhander to the face just about knocking me into the water as well.



## New Name and Format!

After a lot of thought I decided to give our no name newsletter a title.

Having gone over all the diving puns I could I came up with Sea Braggin' ("sea dragon" – if you haven't made the link) which is also a reference to the name of the club i.e. St George and the Dragon.

With the southerly coming up a bit we headed for South West Solitary on the third day. Our boat did dives at West Mooring and Crazy Maze the latter being a series of gullies and sand patches running between a series of bommies. This dive left a lasting impression with the suns rays and bright white sand were brilliant in the 15-20metre vis.

Day 4 and we headed back to North Solitary with flat conditions and blue water. We weren't disappointed as had 30metre plus vis on both dives. It was so good we dived the same site twice – Mackerel Run. It was just the huge grey nurse sharks, turtles, black cod, kingfish and wobbies but we also found a huge school of jewfish. I've never seen anyone move as fast underwater as Ray as soon as he saw them. I'm sure his stomach was rumbling.

Another highlight of this day was an incredible school of hundreds of silver trevally starting at

15 metres and rising all the way to the surface. It was mesmerising.

With the great conditions the day before almost everyone decided to dive a 5th day. Our boat headed for North West where we did the E Gutters and Surgeon reef. At the later we saw a blue devil fish and a numb ray. I hadn't realised either of them got this far north.

With the weather blowing out trip after trip this year it was great to get a consistent run and also some fantastic vis and conditions.

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#### Yongala October 2007 By John Connolly

I had looked forward to this dive for a long time. Talk in the Diving Fraternity creates a great expectation for this dive and it did not disappoint.

The boat trip out from Alva beach is only 30 minutes and there are mooring buoys above the stern, middle and bow of the wreck. Maritime Parks strictly control access and even a medium strength wind will cause a cancellation of any diving. Anchoring by private boats is strictly forbidden.

We tied up on the stern buoy.

Dive 1 - A fierce current gave good reason to heed the instruction to descend holding on to the mooring rope. Even near the bottom, it was a long tiring swim to the bow and more than half of our air was used reaching it.

The first thing you see after entry into the water is giant Trevally, dozens of them that stay under the dive boat - why, nobody knows - they are not fed - but they always instantly turn up. As you descend in the 25m visibility, very pleasant 25C temperature water, many other fish swim up towards you in an ever changing kaleidoscope of school fish.

The sea life is prolific. Two 1m turtles swam past as we went down. Olive sea snakes were everywhere. At one point, I watched two 2m long sea snakes descending only metres away in front of me when I became aware of another ascending right between my legs ! It passed cm in front of my mask ! Do they bleach as they get bigger and older ? These were more a cream color than olive. They were certainly big -2m+ and thicker than my arm.

The marine growth on the Yongala is more than on any wreck I have ever seen. It really has the lot and it supports a huge variety of marine life. And passing by were black and white tipped reef sharks, schools of Spanish Mackeral, Skipjack Tuna, Yellowfin Tuna, Barracouda and a few others that I did not recognise. In and beside the hull were all the typical tropical fish, batfish, a moon wrasse, and many others, some unknown to me.

Entry inside the hull has not been permitted since the 70's. We were told one or two of the letters of Yongala's name on the port bow are visible but we didn't see them. Nor are the supposed human skeletons in the forward hatch. That may have once been the case but the marine plant growth is so abundant that you would assume any remains have been well and truly overgrown.

Maximum depth on this 39 minute dive was 27.4 m and that was on the sand at the bow. With the current, the return to the ascent line was easy. Indeed you had to face into the current and swim slowly to prevent going past everything too quickly.

## **Tank Testing**

Dive 2 - One hour later and the current had stopped ! Bliss !

We descended for a much more relaxed dive. By this time the big boat from Townsville (3 hour trip) had moored on the bow buoy and there were about 60 divers in the water. The Yongala is 108m long though, so it did not seem crowded. It was more of the same fish on the wreck but there were not the passing gamefish schools evident on the first dive. We saw one large (3m) shark (?) in a hull. It looked like a cream colored small basking shark - very big and a very wide flat head - but no one knew what it was. Maybe it was a big faded Wobbegong - do they go that far North.

Maximum depth for this dive was 23.5m and we had 40 minutes in the water. We were nowhere near deco but the 200 bar fills in Aluminum tanks ensure most don't dive longer.

The quick trip back had a slow exit from the water. The tide had gone out and a bar prevented access to the beach, so we all went overboard and waded/swam 100m to the beach. Eventually ropes were attached to the diveboat and pulled up on the beach. Took over an hour to get out of the water.

"Yongala Dive" lodge is quite adequate and has a large International clientele. On my trip I was the only Aussie of 10 divers from 6 countries. Diving Backpackers make this their stop when going from Cairns to the Whitsundays. One warning though - Alva has no food shop or cafes



and a drive of 18km in to Ayr is necessary for either. There is also a good camping ground with inexpensive on-site accommodation.

I would like to have done a second day's diving but after a record 10 days non-stop diving, repairs had to be done to the beach-launching boat trailer. I should be grateful though, as the rest of our St. George group who had booked the Yongala for their return trip from Undersea Explorer missed out due to strong winds.

Maybe we will all have to go back again !

We had two boats for this dive, Le Scat with Les, Michael, Kelly, John P, Peter F and Eddie and Ian's No Name Boat with Ian, Bram, Dave B, Mark R and Mike S. The day before things did not look promising as the weather was bad. However, Sunday turned out nice to start with. We headed out and found that there was little wind but a medium sized south-east swell.

The water looked a bit dirty as we anchored but once in it was not too bad. This could not be said about the water temperature, it was cold, 14C on most peoples' computers. Kelly and I went east and then south and came across Ian, Bram and Mike and then Peter and John. We kept following the edge and soon I heard a funny clicking noise. A few minutes later I found the source of the noise, a reel being used by Dave and Mark, they had come across the top of the reef rather than follow the edge.

Kel and I turned around here and headed back past the boat. I did not have a hood on so was now quite cold. We went a bit past the boat and up to the reef top and found an extraordinary amount of fishlife, yellowtail, silver sweep and seapike as well as pomfrets.

We went back to the anchor and I was happy to ascend early (for me). Upon ascending the weather had deteriorated a lot and the swell was much larger and the wind turned to the south.

After the dive we went to near Darkes Bay and had our usual feast.

A good but cold dive.
